These bright and ambitious students are your 2017 Nolin RECC Washington Youth Tour delegates and they competed with other local youth to earn a trip in June to Washington, D.C., for the 53rd Annual Electric Cooperative Youth Tour.

Young people who experience Youth Tour have the opportunity to explore our nation's capital, make lasting friendships, learn how our government operates, and see the impact electric cooperatives have on the legislative process.

Youth Tour is one of the programs for which electric cooperatives across

the country are best known. These five students traveled in chartered buses along with 78 other youth representing co-ops in various parts of Kentucky. When they reached their final destination, around 1,800 teens along with dozens of chaperones converged on Washington for a fast-paced week of fun and education.

Nolin sponsored five delegates on the all-expense-paid experience: Amelia Cox, Skyler Hornback, Katrina Ingalls, Keeley Slade, and Grayson Stinger.

"I made friendships that will last a life time, memories that will stay with me forever, and had an experience that I never thought could be so amazing," says Cox. "Everyone should get a chance to go

on a life-changing trip like this...it's a trip like no other and will never be forgotten."

Ingalls says Youth Tour exceeded all her expectations. "I gained more friends, saw more sights, ate more food, and made more memories than I ever thought I would, all while growing in my appreciation of our government, leaders, and armed forces," says Ingalls.

So tomorrow morning when you get out of bed, start noting the steps in your routine and see how electricity is a must.”

The comments above were taken from an essay submitted by Washington Youth Tour delegate Amelia Cox. Although her intentions were never to challenge anyone, it may prove interesting to see just how many things are directly influenced by electricity in one day.

Cox was one of five local students who earned a FREE trip to Washington,

D.C., this past June. Although the students enjoyed an all-expense-paid trip, the application process required commitment and accountability from all 14 participants. Each was asked to write a 500-word essay, complete a quiz, and visit the Nolin RECC office for a personal interview.

Interested high school juniors whose parents are members of Nolin apply for the trip with a simple form that takes no longer than three minutes to complete. Watch for applications in your February *Nolin News*. All students completing the application and interview are treated to a day in Frankfort to tour the Capitol building and the Kentucky Vietnam Memorial.

There is nothing hard about the process, and the rewards are well worth the time students invest in the program.


# Investing in Local Youth – It’s a Cooperative Thing

# Look up during the fall harvest

Farming is one of the nation's most hazardous occupations and many farm hazards are related to electricity. Nationally, about 35 farmers are electrocuted each year.

That's why it's so important to always be aware of your surroundings when driving any vehicle that could come in contact with overhead lines.

To be safe during harvest, look up and keep equipment at least 10 feet away from power lines and utility structures. If you are harvesting corn or soybeans this fall, be especially careful that the grain spout stays well below and clear of any overhead lines.

Before moving farm machinery, walk around the entire vehicle and look for hazards. Be aware of guy wires, transformers, and meter sockets.
